MORE ABOUT WASTE WOOD:

One of the best bits of news I've had injected into me in many a moon is the conviction that we have enough waste woods to generate our needed power and heat.

The advantages of cleaning up the woods and chipping the wood for pulp, chip board, and energy are many and evident. One thing is that it is the biggest and most positive step this industry can take to answer many of the pointed questions which are poked at us by the general public. There is no doubt about it; we do leave a lot of wood behind.

There has been no market nor use for this wood in the past. Let us work and labor to see that we have a market for it in the future. If we can keep the government and its swarm of politicians and government representatives out of the picture we can move ahead in a positive and dramatic manner.

I believe we have the knowledge and the machinery and the wood waste to get started right now. The simplest and best place to start is for us in this industry to start using waste wood for industrial heat and electricity. Electrical juice is raising in price faster than smoke goes up so it seems a fine time to cut those outside wires loose and do some generating of electricity with what is now wasted.

I know of a sawmill, a small one that is only a handful of miles from my house, that runs on waste wood. This mill has a steam generating boiler and activated by the steam engines. The sawdust and the planer shavings go into the boiler to make more steam. Handy and efficient and remarkably low priced to operate. Everything in this mill was available for usage in the 1920's. By borrowing some of these concepts and machinery a modern sawmill can be set up so that it runs on the power generated by the waste wood of the mill --- and have electricity to sell.

So you see in many cases we don't have to wait for technology and government subsidies --- we can start almost immediately. Some people started this many years back.

In this issue of Loggers World is some information researched and sought out by Sam Churchill concerning a method of converting sawdust and bark wastes into a fuel pellet called 'Woodex'. I have been told that this is a remarkable clean and efficient boiler fuel. This is not new, this

Woodex, but has been proven time and time again by doing what it was created to do.

The thing that is surprising and gratifying is that thru out our Industry there is a lot of waste wood being used for heating and for generating electricity. Private industry is

going ahead with development, research, building and changing over. Generating electricity for industry from wood waste is here now, it is practical and it is both cheap and efficient. In the face of rising costs of buying electricity it is smart to generate our own and have some left over to sell.

Lovely picture isn't it?

When you run into resistance to this idea remember that this generating of electrical power has been going on in Eugene, Oregon since the forties. Nothing new about it at all.

There have been many good talented people over the years who have tried to come up with some ways to use what we waste in the woods. Up until lately the efforts have mostly been in vain. Now the future for the wasted woods look bright. In addition to generating electricity there is the manufacture of by products. One man told me that he and his partner have a machine that will make a propane type gas from waste woods. Do it cheaply and do it efficiently. By next month we may have an article on this machine.

There are big things afoot --that should be of benefit to mankind. And since I'm part of mankind I'm excited about it!

SALVAGE LOGGING

One big problem that goes along with leaving unmer-

chantable wood material in the woods is that problem of leaving merchantable trees and logs in the woods to rot and go to waste. If it is a crime for our public servants to waste our resources --- well I won't make a judgment on that. There is no doubt **FINLEY HAYS** in the mind of anyone

> who gets out in the woods at all that there is a large amount of trees and logs that are going to waste. There is no argument about that-it is a fact and easily proveable to anyone's satisfaction. Too many trees that are dead, blown over or dying are never going to be of any benefit to anyone. They will die and they will rot and that is the end of it for many trees.

> There is no way that I know of that we can expect to harvest 100 percent of these dead and down trees. Many of them can't be got to and often times they are scattered out and far apart from one another. Two thirds or three quarters of them could be salvaged and we have the people ready and able to salvage them and to pay for the timber they salvage. In the face of this, why can't we be more efficient in this area?

> One thing is the vast amount of red tape and paper work that is necessary for a government agency to legally and officially put up some of this salvage timber for sale. That really is not an excuse now because some agencies have taken up with better and faster methods and can put up a timber sale in a couple of days. So that excuse has no valid-



dam Lee is a busy guy as the owner of Adam's Timber Service.

When he's not tending to his three-year old daughter and five-year old son, a tall task even the most grizzled timber vets would shake a little in their boots at, Lee manages two sides out of Longview, Washington.

The company handles private jobs and also works out logging contracts with area saw mills and works on DNR timber sales. As the boss, Adam puts out fires running to different sides getting done what needs to get done while also keeping work in front of his guys.

"Most days, I'll leave the house going one direction and end up going another," Lee said.

Unlike most loggers that get into the industry at a young age, Lee wasn't from a logging family. His dad worked in construction and his mother worked at a hospital. Growing up in Longview, however, meant that Lee saw plenty of loggers and was



around the industry.

"I always liked logging and all the old timers around logging," Lee said. "I went right into the woods out of high school and bought my first skidder and did private jobs for family and friends."

The skidder, a Clark 666 cable skidder, was properly named. When Lee tried to

drive the skidder home it began to show its true colors.

"Well it caught on fire when we were driving it home after buying it," Lee said. "That should have told me something right







Doosan shovel, a Doosan 300 processor and a 330 CAT processor from the middle 90s. He also has a 95 Skagit tower.

Lee goes with Cascade Trader to get the Doosans. He began getting newer equipment to keep the downtime low and the production high.

"I got tired of being a mechanic more than being a logger," Lee said. "Doosans are the best ones out there for the price and you can't beat them."

Hauling-wise, Adam's Timber Service, contracts about 20 trucks which haul from jobs that can produce anywhere between 20 to thousands of loads. Adam's brother Jason, who owns a log truck, also helps out when Adam is short-handed and needs an extra hand.

"For the small private jobs I

do a lot of that work myself," Lee said. "It's more hands-on with the landowners and it's pretty nice getting to to know people and not just be another contract."

For cutting, Lee either does it himself or contracts out Wild Wood Timber.

When he's not doing that he's running between two jobsites, he's keeping work coming down the pipeline. He admits he

doesn't run too much machinery anymore but that's the name of the game for a boss.

"I do like that we can offer family-supporting wages in this area," Lee said.

Adam's Timber Service works in Southwest Washington and Northwest Oregon. With a wide range in job sizes, the company is versatile and Lee says he has a good group of guys.

"One of the biggest hurdles this days along with changing rules is finding good employees," Le said. "And I have a really good group of guys that have been with the company ranging from four years to a couple months."

Usually they work within three hours of Longview as the nice central location of the Washington port city pays off for logging companies.

His wife Breanne does the bookkeeping for the company to keep things in order, and the two go camping often with their two children.

"The hardest part with logging is always dealing with everyday events, there's always something different being thrown at you," Lee said.

But this is what Lee wanted to do and continues to do.

"I've been in the woods since I was five years old and I wanted to log," Lee said. "It's very rare for people to do what they love, but I'm lucky enough to do that."







(Continued from Page 2) ity anymore.

Another thing is that we have structured many of our agencies so that the best protection for an individual in those agencies is to do nothing. You don't get into trouble for doing nothing, you get in trouble for doing something and doing something wrong. The emphasis isn't on production, or so I'm told, it is on staying out of trouble.

That is something that needs the cure of good sense.

The fact is that we are wasting millions of feet of good timber that we don't need to waste. Why do we allow it?

There are many practical reasons for developing the harvesting and using of waste wood. Not the least is that it should decrease forest fires and the cost of fire protection. Another thing to consider is that we are talking about more employment, more machinery and the creating of a new industry to harvest waste wood.

I hope to be able to visit Michigan again and to inspect and investigate a wood processing system that sounds tremendous. The whole tree comes into this one place. It is bucked into logs and the high grade logs are sold. The low grade logs are cut in this sawmill. All slabs and limbs and unused parts of the tree will be chipped. The chips will be divided into 'pulp chips' and 'energy chips'. Pulp chips are high grade and the energy chips are used for fuel. Energy chips include leaves and bark. Nothing is wasted --- not even the squeal!

It is very rewarding to measure the response of our first issue of Loggers World talking about using our now wasted wood. For instance Carl Giles has been digging into the subject with enthusiasm. He wants to go with me to look over that new mill and chipping plant at Morbark in Michigan.

In all seriousness I make this statement: "I don't care what I think about the future of using wood waste, I don't care what you think about the future of using our waste woods -- no matter what we think of the program we have underestimated it."

The program is bigger, will answer more problems and do more good than we think it will.





A Crummy Education?

This piece was sent to me back in 2015. It was written by a son (Randy Larson) to be shared at his dad's funeral.

I've been thinking about how to use it ever since because I like what it says about the people in our industry. Finally, I just decided to go with it because we all had fathers or influential men in our lives and I think it helps us acknowledge the direction that we gained from them. I hope it helps all of us remember that right now, we may be having this kind of influence on some young lives. Let's remember that and be the best examples that we can be.

The great 1937 movie Captains Courageous is the story of a spoiled privileged boy who accidentally falls from an ocean liner and is rescued by a group of fishermen. Manuel, one of the sailors, takes the belligerent young person and over the course of the fishing season, turns the young man into a caring and co-operative crewman. Manuel had had a fisherman father who had given him a wonderful life educaing a rough and tumble group. Essentially one rung on the ladder above a skid row bum. I saw a complete different side. Growing up the most secure and happy moments were riding in the crummy with my father and his crew. thought it might be a good idea if I went to a Christian college. I had a lot of fun for a while but then I began to doubt my religious training. Theology, apologetics, required chapels, and tons of petty rules didn't quite do it for a young man

college but when he went, he found that many of the instructors and staff didn't understand the Christian relationship as well as the loggers he worked alongside". Mr. Hayes article hit me on the street I lived on! My story indeed!



Obama's Wyoming Land Grab Killed by Appeals Court

In the most lawless administration in history, one Obama outfit stood out. His Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) distinguished itself for hostility to the rule of law, nowhere more outrageously than with a massive land grab in Wyoming. Happily for legal precedent, rural Wyomingites, and EPA administrator Scott Pruitt, who has much to undo, a recent ruling by the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Tenth Circuit in Denver overturned the EPA edict that ignored nearly 115 years of history.

In 2013, pursuant to the Clean Air Act, the EPA granted the Northern Arapaho and Eastern Shoshone Tribes authority to regulate air quality programs as to the Wind River Indian Reservation in west-central Wyoming. Unfortunately, the EPA acceded to the Tribes' demand that their jurisdiction encompassed lands long known as outside the Reservation, including the town of Riverton (population 11,000). The EPA had help; it acknowledged "input from other federal agencies," and that its "determination is

consistent with a 2011 Opinion of the Solicitor of the U.S. Department of the Interior." Interior has been home to the Indian Bureau since 1824 and the 500-pound gorilla on these issues since 1873 when Congress transferred territorial responsibilities for the American West there from the State Department.

The Reservation was established in 1868, but, in 1904, the Tribes entered into an agreement with the United States to cede 1.48 million acres of land in exchange for per capita payments to tribal members and capital improvement projects within the Reservation. In 1905, Congress ratified the agreement, declared the lands were "ceded, granted, relinquished, and conveyed" to the United States, and referenced the new Reservation as "the diminished reserve." In 1906, the ceded lands were opened for settlement by Presidential Proclamation; the land was sold to non-Indians, including land that became Riverton. In 1939, some of the unsold ceded lands were restored to the

Reservation, but much of the land, including all land within Riverton city limits, was not.

Over $_{
m the}$ decades, Congress, the Supreme Court, and the Wyoming Supreme Court wrote of "lands formerly embraced in the [Reservation]," of the "diminished reservation," and of lands that were "ceded, granted, and relinquished." Challenges by tribal members of their convictions in state court for crimes committed in Riverton were rejected, on one occasion with amicus support for Wyoming from the United States.

Unfortunately, the Solicitor made unmitigated hash of this undisputed history. Sadly, her opinion slavishly tracked the Tribes' 2008 EPA application in which they cherry-picked bits of congressional hearings and self-serving tribal documents but ignored federal court rulings, the 1904 agreement, the 1905 Act, and their precise and binding language. Most egregious is the Solicitor's failure to address a 1998 ruling of the U.S. Supreme Court on another tribe's similar assertion. A unanimous Court, in an opinion by Justice O'Connor, held Congress set forth "the most certain statutory language, evincing [its] intent to diminish the [Reservation] by providing for total cession and fixed compensation."

The State of Wyoming quickly sued as did the Wyoming Farm Bureau Federation—represented by Mountain States Legal Foundation—given its members' fears they would be subject to Tribal civil and criminal jurisdiction. Such fears seemed justified after Riverton Memorial Hospital—a non-Indian entity, organized under the laws of the State of Delaware—was hauled into tribal court for medical malpractice.

In a 2-1 ruling, Judge Timothy M. Tymkovich held, "This case requires us to determine whether Congress diminished the boundaries of the Wind River Reservation in Wyoming in 1905. We find that it did." In doing so, he rejected attempts to read into Congress's action:

"[O]ur task is not to divine why Congress may have chosen certain synonyms over others in this particular Act. We believe Congress's use of the word 'cede' can only mean one thing—a diminished reservation." People in rural Wyoming breathed a sigh of relief. Meanwhile, the Tribes have until May 25 to seek en banc review.






OLD SINGLE AXLE TRUCK

This is a nice side view of an old-time log truck and trailer. This early model is sporting wooden wheels and the trailer has no brake system. Also, a sharp eye will note that the truck is a chain drive affair. The trailer has two bunks, one with cheese blocks. The purpose of the bunks is to keep the trailer from tipping ahead during pulling and breaking the wood pole reach. Also, the reach is hooked up under the truck so that the truck's log bunk is the only one that has to swivel. This system worked a lot like fifth wheel trailers of today. With only one axle having something to call brakes, the early truck roads could not have any steep grades.





ABOVE: TIE HACKS

A tie hack takes his product to town. A tie hack was a Woodsman whose job was to cut railroad ties, and not all of them were cut in sawmills. Tie hacks would buy small stands of small trees, and after falling a tree he'd usually buck it into 9 foot lengths. Flattening two sides to a seven or eight inch thickness, he'd have a hand hewn tie. Tie hacking was hard work, but a good hack who could cut 20 to 25 ties a day usually made good money for the day. This tie hack, Ben Thomas, working in Montana in 1935 was doing okay. He's got a nice truck for himself in the dark days of the depression.




